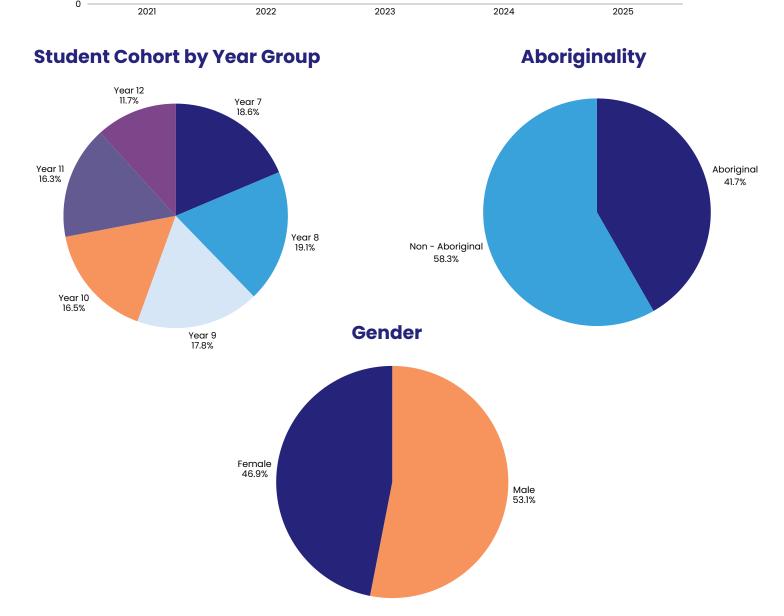

This report provides an analysis of Overall Secondary Attendance from 2022 to 2024, comparing Hedland SHS with Like Schools and WA Public Schools.

Key Insights (2022-2024)

Non-Aboriginal Students

Attendance among non-Aboriginal students at Hedland Senior High School has shown a positive upward trend, increasing from 77% in 2022 to 83.4% in 2024. Notably, the school outperformed like schools in both 2023 and 2024. However, attendance rates remain slightly below the WA Public Schools average, which has consistently remained above 84%.

Aboriginal Students

Aboriginal student attendance at Hedland SHS showed remarkable improvement, rising from 52.9% in 2022 to 62.9% in 2023, before experiencing a slight dip to 61.4% in 2024. The school's performance surpassed that of like schools and WA Public Schools, highlighting its commitment to culturally responsive engagement and attendance initiatives.

Overall Attendance

The school's total attendance rose from 68% in 2022 to 74.7% in 2023, maintaining a similar level in 2024 at 74.5%. Although Hedland SHS outperformed like schools in 2023 and 2024. Overall attendance continues to trail the WA Public Schools average, which remains consistently above 82%, highlighting the importance of sustained whole-school attendance initiatives.

This report provides an analysis of secondary student attendance across four key categories: Regular, At Risk – Indicated, At Risk – Moderate, and At Risk – Severe from 2022 to 2024. Comparative data from Like Schools and WA Public Schools for 2024 are also included to contextualise performance.

Key Insights (2022 - 2024)

Regular Attendance: Improved significantly from 17.3% in 2022 to 30.8% in 2024, indicating enhanced student engagement and attendance efforts. Our school exceeds Like Schools slightly in Regular Attendance but underperforms compared to WA Public Schools by a substantial margin (30.8% vs. 48.0%).

At Risk (Indicated): Increased slightly from 25.5% in 2022 to 27.4% in 2023, then decreased marginally to 26.9% in 2024.

At Risk (Moderate): Dropped substantially from 30.2% in 2022 to around 21.6% in 2024.

At Risk (Severe): Declined from 26.9% in 2022 to 20.8% in 2023 and remained steady in 2024. Severe Risk is notably higher than the state average (20.8% vs. 12.0%) but better than Like Schools (20.8% vs. 27.4%).

There has been meaningful progress in improving regular attendance since 2022, with a reduction in moderate and severe attendance risks. However, despite this improvement, our school's attendance rates still fall below the state average in certain areas.

Recommendations:

- Targeted interventions for students in the Severe Risk category to close the gap with WA Public Schools.
- Proactive monitoring and early intervention strategies to identify and support students before attendance concerns escalate.

Overall, while positive trends are evident, continued strategic focus on culturally responsive engagement and attendance interventions will be crucial in achieving further improvements.

NAPLAN Achievement

Overview

The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) assesses students across Australia in Years 3, 5, 7, and 9. The data collected provides valuable insights into student performance and complements teacher judgments. At Hedland Senior High School, NAPLAN is one of several tools used within our comprehensive school self-assessment cycle to inform continuous improvement in teaching and learning programs.

In 2023, NAPLAN underwent significant changes: the testing window was moved from May to March, and the assessment scale was reset. As a result, NAPLAN results from 2023 onward cannot be directly compared with those from previous years. This marks the beginning of a new data time series, and no progress or proficiency levels will be reported until 2025. Future reports will include four proficiency levels: Exceeding, Strong, Developing, and Needs Additional Support.

All Learning Areas at Hedland SHS are committed to developing students' literacy and numeracy skills through the strategic implementation of the Teaching and Learning Framework, the Hedland Instructional Model, and the Orderly Learning Environment.

Additionally, the Learning Support Coordinator continues to provide targeted literacy and numeracy support for students identified as 'at risk', offering them opportunities to improve their NAPLAN outcomes.

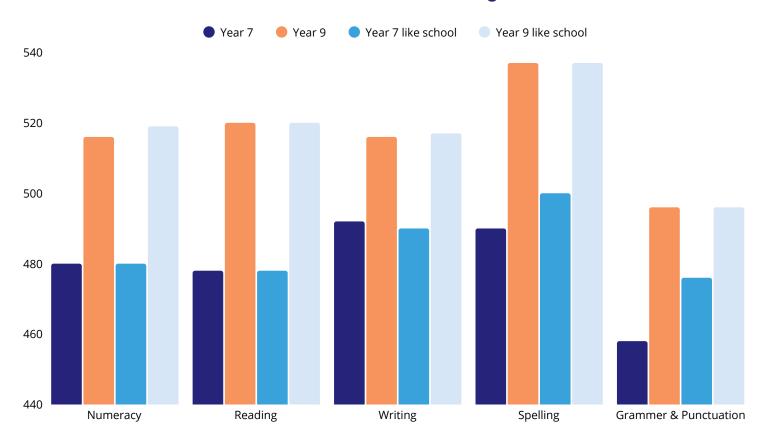

NAPLAN Achievement

2024 NAPLAN School Average



Analysis of the graphical data indicates that Hedland Senior High School has either shown measurable improvement or maintained performance levels consistent with those of like schools across all NAPLAN components. This trend reflects the school's ongoing commitment to evidence-based teaching practices and targeted student support. The alignment with comparable like schools highlights the effectiveness of the school's strategic planning and instructional frameworks in fostering academic growth and sustaining achievement in literacy and numeracy.



NAPLAN/OLNA Performance

Overview

To meet one of the Western Australian Certificate of Education (WACE) achievement requirements, students must demonstrate a minimum standard of literacy and numeracy. This can be achieved by:

- Reaching the required standard in Year 9 NAPLAN and prequalifying for the Online Literacy and Numeracy Assessment (OLNA), or
- Sitting the OLNA in Years 10, 11, and 12 until the standard is met.

The school provides significant support to students who need it, including assistance through mainstream classes, and dedicated preparation classes.

Recent changes by the School Curriculum and Standards Authority (SCSA) now allow students to sit their first OLNA assessment in late Year 9. This early opportunity gives a selected group of Year 9 students extended access to targeted, data-informed support and conferencing ahead of their second OLNA attempt in Year 10.

OLNA Achievement

Overview

Students typically attempt OLNA in Year 10, and those who do not meet the standard are given four additional opportunities—two in Year 11 and two in Year 12—to achieve OLNA.

Early intervention strategies at Hedland SHS are beginning to show positive outcomes, as evidenced by higher Year 9 qualification rates observed in the Year 11 cohort. However, Year 10 remains a critical area of focus, with a significantly higher proportion of students not yet meeting the OLNA standard compared to like schools. While Year 12 data indicates that progress is being made, the proportion of students exiting without achieving OLNA requirements suggests that additional targeted support and sustained intervention are necessary to further improve outcomes.

To further support students, the English Learning Area has implemented OLNA-focused classes that use targeted intervention strategies to address specific literacy needs. Additionally, the school has allocated FTE to develop and deliver specialised OLNA intervention sessions, ensuring students receive structured and consistent support to help them succeed.

Student Performance: ATAR

Overview

In 2024, 5 students from Hedland SHS strived to complete a full ATAR program (4+ ATAR courses). This is significantly smaller number than in 2023 and the comparability against previous data. The Senior School Deputy Principal (Tegan Walker), Student Support Manager (Alice Colbeck) and all the teaching staff worked with the Year 12 ATAR students throughout the year to manage their workload, support their school and achievement and prepare for examinations.

Hedland SHS committed continuing to run face to face classes with 3 students per ATAR class, as well as a combination of some courses run by SIDE (School of Isolated and Distance Education). With continued support, ongoing progress monitoring and the provision of tutoring and revision programs, the number of ATAR courses run within the school will continue to grow or be maintained.

Student Performance: VET

Overview

Below is an overview of our Certificates students were enrolled in from years 10 to 12, in various delivery pathways such as School Based Traineeships, VDSS students, Fee for Services students delivered externally by private and government RTO's with various delivery arrangements such as face to face, classroom and workplace sites. We had an increase in our Cert III and IV enrolments as well as our SBT program across year 11 and 12. This year we commenced the year with a with a total of 90 School Based Trainee's over year 11 and 12 enrolled in 9 different Qualifications. The number of students who attained apprenticeships from completing SBT program in 2024 year 12 were 31 out of 37.

Highlights were 3 year 12 students made it through to the semi finals of School Based Trainee of the year 2024, Jade Sawtell studying a Certificate III Allied Health at WACHS, Taya Sawtell studying a Certificate II Rail Infrastructure with Cat 5 and hosted to BHP Rail and Joziah Taylor studying a Certificate II Sport and Recreation with Programmed hosted to ToPH. Taya Sawtell made it as a finalist and attended the Department of Training Awards Presentation in August. She is also featured on the Construction Training Website as an Ambassador for females in the Construction Industry. Quincy Pako studying a Cert II Rail Infrastructure also won the Port Hedland Chamber of Commerce and Industry Award for Trainee and Apprentice of the year 2025

Follow the Dream supports the aspirations of selected Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students Year 7 – 12 to successfully complete their secondary schooling and engage in a meaningful post-school pathway. Achieving academic success lies at the heart of the program with students recognised for both in school and out of school achievement, participation and leadership. In addition to academic achievement and extension, Follow the Dream students experience a range of activities that enrich learning and broaden horizons. Post-school study and career options are explored; culture is celebrated and general capabilities developed to assist students to be the best they can be. Follow the Dream supports ensure students maintain a meaningful pathway and achieve to their aspirations.

After school sessions operated 3 days a week all year, enabling students to access individualised after-school tutoring and mentoring to improve performance across all areas of the curriculum. In school tuition for senior students provided additional monitoring and academic opportunities to enhance learning.

In 2024, 40 students were selected due to meeting the selection criteria and commitments to the requirements for the program. Over 1300 subject specific tutoring hours were dedicated to improving student results, in addition to specialist courses and certificates and careers mentoring facilitated by the Program Coordinator, Jessica Albers. Students participating throughout 2024 had significant curriculum achievements across all learning areas, including improvements in assessment results, grades, NAPLAN, OLNA and ABE results resulting from individualised, targeted and ongoing supports delivered in a culturally responsive manner.

The experiences and opportunities our program offer strengthen a sense of belonging and connection to community and empowers students to pursue their aspirations.



The Clontarf Foundation exists to improve the education, discipline, life skills, self-esteem, and employment prospects of young Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander men and, by doing so, equip them to participate more meaningfully in society.

The Foundation has been in operation at Hedland Senior High School since 2019 and is in place to support its Year 7-12 Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander boys as they navigate their way through high school education into the work force. As it currently stands, we have had 78 boys who have completed Year 12 since 2019.

The growth of the program in Hedland has been overwhelming. In 2024, the Academy had a huge number of graduates, with 15 boys completing Year 12. The fantastic part of the programme is our continued support for our graduates in seeking full-time employment or further study. Currently, 7 of the 15 have secured full-time employment here in Hedland, with a number of other boys beginning their apprenticeships.

We finished 2024 with 162 participants, which makes Hedland Clontarf Academy the biggest single site academy in Western Australia. Academy attendance over 2024 finished at 77% for the year, we're hopeful of increasing this to around the 80% mark moving into 2025. Another huge milestone for the Hedland Academy in 2024 was Health Checks. Health Checks are a vital tool in helping us pick up any undiagnosed issues that the boys may not be aware off. 140 boys successfully completed a Health Check from the amazing team from Sonic Health. The most of any Academy in WA.

Our Vision: Empowered Aboriginal Girls and Women

Shooting Stars is an educational based engagement program delivered at Hedland Senior High School. The purpose is to not only support Aboriginal girls and young women to increase their school attendance and engagement, but also to help strengthen their confidence, cultural identity, well-being and positive relationships. We work with participants to grow their capacity and resources to make informed decisions for themselves, unlocking the door to self-determination and empowerment so they can reach their full potential.

At Hedland Senior High School, the Shooting Stars program commenced in 2021 and continues to grow in numbers and capacity. The program support Aboriginal & Torres Strait Islander girls in years 7-12. The program and staff provide advocacy and support, engagement activities, reward and incentive opportunities and health & wellbeing sessions to strengthen student' confidence, cultural identity and positive attitudes towards community and their school journey.

Success Program

The Hedland Senior High School Success Program completed its fourth year in 2024. The program continues to provide ongoing support to VET and ATAR students to pursue post-school pathways in students' chosen fields.

Redefining Success

The Redefining Success Program supports students with special educational needs with a focus on developing literacy and numeracy, and skills to support students in developing independence.

Steps to Success

Steps to Success is based on a primary school model, where students work with a smaller group of teachers to build positive relationships. Students are provided with wraparound support, and a curriculum is focused on literacy and numeracy skills development and social emotional learning.

Working for Success

Students work through a program of work focused on preparing students for post-schoolwork or further training pathways. Their program consists of a combination of English, Mathematics, Health and Physical Education and options courses. Students are also provided with opportunities to participate in work placements and complete job-ready skills and/or micro-credentials.

Striving for Success

Striving for Success is an intensive off-site program for students who require extensive wraparound support. Students work to an alternative curriculum based on meeting student academic, behavioural, social-emotional and wellbeing needs. The goal of the program is to support students in re-engaging students back into mainstream schooling or the other Success Program classes.

Achievements

- Annual attendance rates in Striving for Success and Steps to Success are exceeding three year rolling average attendance.
- Working for Success students were provided with opportunities to improve their chances of WACE attainment, such as completing the Employment Advantage Program, workplace learning, and literacy, numeracy and social emotional learning interventions.
- 27 students across the Success Programs engaged in work exploration or workplace learning.
- Three students in Working for Success signed up for school-based traineeships (to be completed in 2025).
- In 2024, we had two Year 12 students graduate from the Redefining Success program. This program has grown in demand an in 2025, Redefining Success will consist of two classes.
- The Redefining Success Program introduced swimming lessons as an opportunity to increase engagement at school.
- ·46 Year 10 students were provided with the opportunity to develop skills in engineering metals fabrication through the two day "Try a Trade" incursions.

BHP Pilbara Education Partnership

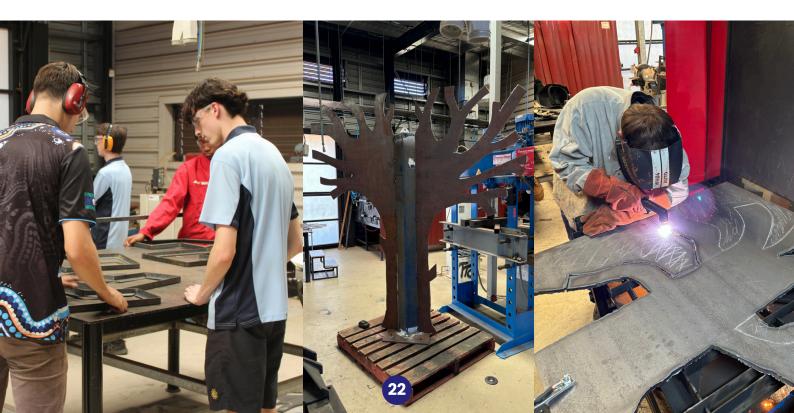
ATAR Program

The BHP Pilbara Education Partnership Pathways Strategy provides resourcing to support students to achieve WACE, and to increase the percentage of students receiving university offers. The ATAR Program has provided students with access to curriculum resources, study skills development and opportunities to access revision classes in Perth.

- ATAR students accessed revision programs in Perth during the September school holidays.
- Year 10-12 students participated in Elevate Education Study Skills training.
- Curriculum and ICT resources were purchased to provide additional support to students on ATAR pathways.

Trade Training Centre

The Trade Training Centre is an exclusive program which delivers high quality trade training and support to students wishing to pursue careers in the Metals Fabrication Industry. Certificate II Engineering (Metals Fabrication) is delivered alongside Industry Standards through on the job training through a School Based Traineeship with work placements and off the job training in the Trade Training Centre. Throughout this program students will be able to work alongside Employers such as BHP, Fortescue Metals Group, Monadelphous and QUBE which will increase the number of students successfully transitioning from the TTC to post- secondary qualifications and employment.

Workshops with Year 10 Drama students and Specialist Arts Students to create characters and consider movement choices. We were treated to a live performance and Q&A after the play.

New Sounds Dance Incursion (Year 7, 8 and 10) Term 1

All classes learnt choreography from visiting artist: Mubanga in a one-hour session each.

Spoilbank Marina - Artist in Residence program

Students involved in SAP 2D Visual Arts worked with a local artist to design and paint the bollards which are part of the new Spoilbank Marina in Port Hedland.

Arts Away camp - Specialist Arts students- Term 3- Students in Year 9-12 enjoyed a week in Perth where they were introduced to future studies and careers across all disciplines.

Country Week - Dance

Arts Showcase - Semester One and Semester Two. Our bi-annual showcase celebrating the Arts and the amazing work our students produce. These nights include exhibitions of Media, Photography and Visual Art, along with performances from Music, Dance and Drama students across all year groups.

Mythic Portraits - an online workshop delivered by the National Portrait Gallery, featuring the Australian artist, Atong Atem. 2D SAP students explored culture in self-portraiture.

Drama Production - Working with PCC Productions, SAP students received hands on experiences in lighting and sound through Matt Dann Theatre.

Mathematics

In 2024, the Mathematics Learning Area has made significant strides in fostering a high-quality learning environment for all students. A cornerstone of our approach has been the effort of all mathematics teachers in implementing the Quality Teaching Standards framework and the Hedland Instructional Model in their routine teaching. This commitment to staff improving pedagogy has been pivotal in enhancing student engagement and achievement. To further support student learning, particularly in preparation for NAPLAN and OLNA, Mathspace has been strategically employed to ensure consistent homework and online mathematics practice. The Year 12 General Mathematics EST assessment feedback was exceptionally positive. A notable success is the ongoing growth in student participation in ATAR Mathematics courses. The provision of both Mathematics Applications and Mathematics Methods has catered to diverse student aspirations and contributed to this increased engagement in higher-level mathematics. This year the extension students were invited to attend the Australian Mathematics Competition, a nationwide competition. There were seventeen students who sat the quiz, and one student achieved a High Distinction that placed her in the top 3% of students in the country.

The Mathematics Department at Hedland Senior High School remained committed to fostering a culture of excellence and continuous improvement. Aligned with the school's core values of Care, Courtesy, Respect, and Responsibility, the department focused on enhancing student engagement, deepening conceptual understanding, and promoting real-world applications of mathematical principles.

Curriculum Highlights

Year 10 Surface Area and Volume Unit: Students delved into the concepts of surface area and volume across various geometric shapes. The unit culminated in problem-solving activities that emphasized the application of formulas and step-by-step methodologies. To celebrate their learning, students created a vibrant tessellation display, now proudly showcased in the Mathematics Foyer.

Year 7 Pi Day Celebration: On March 14th, Year 7 students participated in an engaging Pi Day event. The lesson explored the historical development of π, highlighting its significance in Babylonian, Egyptian, and Greek engineering and architecture.

MAWA Conference

Two staff members attended the 2024 WA Annual Maths Conference organized by the Mathematical Association of Western Australia. The conference, themed "Maths Growth for All," offered insights into innovative teaching strategies, curriculum development, and student engagement techniques. Attendees returned with renewed enthusiasm and practical ideas to enrich classroom instruction.

Curriculum Development

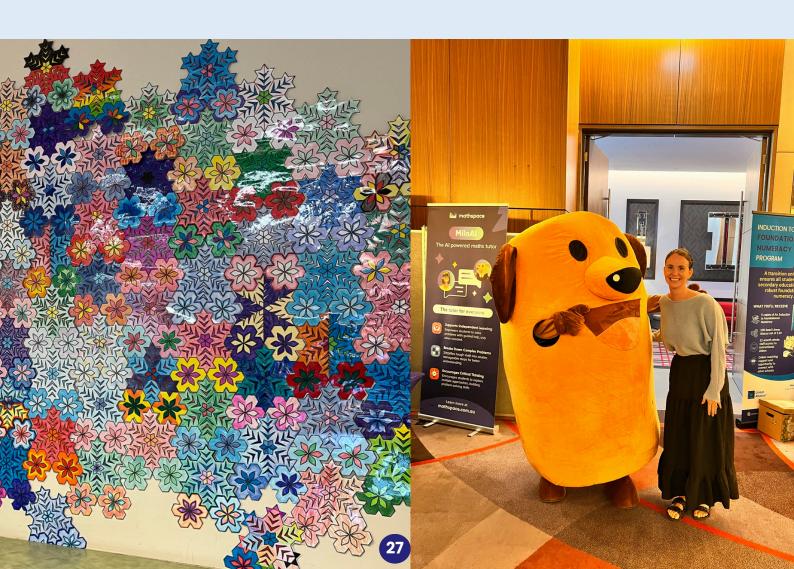
The department continued to refine its curriculum, integrating culturally responsive pedagogies and aligning assessments with standardized benchmarks. Collaborative planning sessions ensured consistency in instructional approaches and assessment practices across year levels.

Technology Integration

The Mathematics Department continues to utilise Mathspace as a key digital platform to support student learning. All students are provided with individual accounts, enabling them to access tailored lessons and practice exercises both at school and from home. Where possible, one dedicated lesson per week is allocated to Mathspace in class, allowing teachers to monitor progress, identify learning gaps, and provide targeted support. This consistent integration of technology into the learning program enhances student confidence and promotes independent learning habits.

Conclusion

The Mathematics Department at Hedland Senior High School achieved significant milestones in 2024, marked by innovative teaching practices, student engagement, and professional growth. Building on this momentum, the department is well positioned to further enhance its programs and outcomes in the coming year, fully committed to its mission to empower students through mathematics.



Humanities & Social Sciences

Compass Leadership

Our innovative team continues to champion the use of Compass as a valuable learning and communication tool. The dedicated team transitioned all Learning Tasks onto the Compass platform to provide assessment feedback via rubrics to parents, carers and students in real time. Staff have also exhibited 100% compliance for Course documentation. The use of Resources and Lesson Plans has resulted in improved interactions with the platform for staff, students and parents/carers to enhance learning opportunities and for families to take a more active role in their child's learning.

Elective Programs:

Student engagement with HaSS continues to grow evidenced by the uptake with our Elective course offerings. In 2024, the HASS department ran the following electives:

- Crime and Justice (Year 10)
- History Mysteries (Year 9)
- World of Money (Year 9)

This uptake is a result of student interest and improved engagement with the lower school curriculum. Students are able to home in on an interest area, debate complex issues affecting society and improve financial literacy by selecting one of these classes. A year 10 student said about Crime and Justice "this was the most useful subject I have done at high school. It should be compulsory". This represents strong engagement with the program.

Civics Leadership Tour – Sydney/Canberra

The annual Canberra and Sydney Tour continues to be a rite of passage for Year 9 and 10 students after the post covid revival in 2023.

Mr Dawud, Mrs Felgate, Mr Hayward and Miss David accompanied 38 students in Week 10, Term 2 to Canberra and Sydney for an incredible immersive experience. The 9-day camp afforded students the opportunity to experience the institutions that collectively represent Australia's history, democracy and identity. For many of our Year 9's and 10's, this was the first significant time of away from family and for many, travelling interstate. Students forged friendships, increased social capabilities and developed extensive knowledge and skills.

Students participated in a wide range of programs at Parliament House, The Australian War Memorial, The Sydney Jewish Museum and other significant locations to see in practice how our country is governed, how laws are made and how our complex history is remembered. The activities supplement the Western Australian curriculum delivered at school for Year 9 & 10 History and Civics & Citizenship.

ATAR - Modern History

HASS is celebrating the uptake of Year 11 Modern History for the first time in many years. Led by Mr Tristan James, students undertook in-depth learning of Capitalism in America and Nazi Germany between the world wars. Hedland Senior High School is proud to offer the course face to face. The smaller teacher to student ratios enables students to excel in their studies with an individualised approach to their learning needs.

ICT Innovation and Work Readiness

HASS staff underwent drone training in Term 4, led by Ms Kim Mace – Head of STEM and Innovation. Drone technology is quickly becoming the norm in many industries particularly in agriculture, mining, urban planning and even disaster relief. This training using SHEMAPS will upskill staff to embed drone skills in the Term 3 Geography programs in lower School HASS across Year 7-10. This is to ensure students are skilled in drone technology use, operations and safety, and equip them with work ready skills they may need in various roles in different industries in the future.



Student Support

In 2024, the Student Support team consisted of:

- Student Support Managers
- Student Support Officers
- AIEO's
- School Counsellor
- School Psychologists

Though navigating staffing challenges, we ended the year successfully with improvements in our behaviour and engagement data and improved positive relationships between staff, students, their families and the wider Hedland community. We worked closely with our AIEO team, Clontarf and Shooting Stars to improve student outcomes and communication with our community. We have strong relationships with our Statewide Services, such as School of Special Needs: Behaviour and Engagement (SSEN:BE) and the School of Alternative Learning Settings. 13 students completed the SALS program and positively transitioned back to our school.

Our staff have worked tirelessly with interagency across our community such as CAMHS, Julyardi, Relationships Australia, Town of Port Hedland, MacKillop, Headspace and Helping Minds, across individual cases, small group interventions and events.

We were able to implement small group interventions which targeted particular student needs across social and emotional learning.

These include:

- · Ed Connect Mentoring (4 students)
- · Seasons For Growth a program for managing grief, loss and change (20 students)
- · Te Ara Tika a program for our Polynesian students (20 students)
- · Zones of Regulation a self-regulation program (24 students)
- · Peer Skills a program to increase social skills (10 students)



It is through small group interventions that we are able to address building positive relationships, social and emotional learning and behavioural needs. This is through the Multi-Tiered Systems of Support and we continue to build on this.

The Student Support Team have been able to present and collaborate with the wider teaching staff on multiple occasions to present a variety of professional learning. These include Trauma Informed Classrooms, Strategies for Co-Regulation in the Classroom, Stronger Smarter and Zones of Regulation. In doing this, we have been able to support our staff to ensure trauma informed practice, high-expectations relationships and strategies for regulation within the classroom setting.

STEAM, Innovation and ICT

2024 was a year of exploration and discovery for the STEAM (Science Technology, Engineering, Arts and Mathematics), Innovation, and ICT department. We embarked on a journey to equip all Year 7 and 8 students with essential Digital Technologies skills, laying the groundwork for their future success. Our Year 9 and 10 students embraced the opportunity to delve deeper into their passions through engaging electives in Digital Technology, STEM, and Robotics. We partnered with industry leaders CME and Grok Academy to introduce exciting Data Science modules, sparking curiosity and fostering critical thinking. The hands-on Robotics and Micro bit lessons, delivered in collaboration with CME, ignited a passion for innovation. One teacher delivered an innovative project with Year 8 students, using basketball statistics to bring data analysis to life. In STEM lessons students were given the opportunity to fly microdrones and gain knowledge of careers in the drone industry through case studies in Australia after floods, and bushfires.

The after-school STEM club grew with the addition of ten Year 5 and 6 students joining our HSHS students rebuilding computers, using Raspberry Pi to recreate old school computer games, and of course coding Mars Rover and VR.

ASPIRE UWA Incursion

University students travelled to the Pilbara to engage with students and the possibility of university pathway, STEM and engineering pathways. In the evening some students were invited out for dinner with the students to discuss life at university.

Australian Maths Competition 2024

The competition is designed each year by leading educators and academics. The AMC is a fun and engaging way for students to test their mathematical problem-solving skills.

Seventeen entries resulted in a number of credits and one High Distinction.



Chemistry and Physics Olympiads 29th July and 1st August

Nationwide competition exams open to students in Year 11. One Credit and One Distinction achieved.

National Science Week 5 Term 3

Saving Endangered Species using Technology

Year 8 made sustainable and recycled plant pots and grew seedlings, Year 10's analysed whale snot, wildlife photography in media, making drones with balloons, species counting and recording in Maths, endangered animal poster competition in GEL.

Techtrails Conference and Community event

3rd September 2024

All Year 9 and Year 8 students attended an all-day event hosted at Hedland SHS. The WitWa team (Women in Technology of WA) gave talks to students, and they moved around the 45-minute sessions with their programs and name tags. They were listening, taking part in activities and having lots of discussion about careers in tech and opportunities that are now evolving in local industries. In the evening the community were invited for pizza and to listen to a panel discussion on STEM power.



Minister's Innovation Challenge 2024

A teams of Year 8 students worked together to develop an innovative solution to the problem "the elderly cannot access the beach to watch the turtle nesting in Port Hedland." Students were mentored and led through a series of tasks to develop their idea, with the challenge culminating in an online pitch presentation.

STEAM Fest 2024

A tech fest on display. On 28th November every department put on display a way that they use tech or STEAM to teach in their department. Outside partners were also invited including the local primary schools.

Too many to mention but Pilbara Ports set up a huge display, Gyton showed off his 3D printed ducks from BPL, VR headsets were a huge success, Mars robotics, Arts show 3D pottery, the army gave a talk on drone images and uses, all departments really showed off their talent and innovation in keeping Hedland SHS students up to date with the latest innovation driving our local industry. Students got involved and thoroughly enjoyed their session at the STEAM Fest.



Science

In 2024, the Science Department offered 25 lower school courses and 13 senior school courses, supported by a dedicated team of 10 teachers and two laboratory technicians who played a crucial role in student learning.

The department welcomed three new staff members, bringing fresh perspectives and valuable expertise. Two joined through the international program, while the third brought extensive experience in STEM and extension science from Perth. Though one staff member left during the year, we were fortunate to gain two additional teachers, further enriching the department's diversity and experience.

Throughout the year, teachers differentiated instruction to support students with diverse academic needs—providing targeted scaffolding for those requiring additional support, while fostering higher-order thinking through enrichment and challenge-based learning for high-achieving students.

Our broad curriculum supports students in both university and vocational pathways. Recognising the uniqueness of each student's educational journey, the Science team is committed to catering to individual pathways by offering tailored support, flexible course options, and learning experiences aligned with students' personal goals and future aspirations. For example, in General Marine and Maritime Studies, students worked towards their Skipper's Ticket in Hedland's new marina, and our ATAR Biology students explored local marine flora and fauna at Cemetery Beach. These experiences were further enriched by partnerships with local industry, providing students with valuable, real-world connections to careers in the Hedland sectors.

A standout achievement this year was the recognition of one of our students, who received external awards for excellence in both Physics and Chemistry—a testament to her dedication and the high quality of support from her teachers.

Beyond the classroom, most Science staff actively participated in the school-wide STEAMfest event. Teachers hosted interactive and engaging stalls on chemical reactions, microscope techniques, and a gravity simulator, sparking curiosity and promoting scientific thinking across the school community.

Throughout the year, we worked towards making collaboration central to our practice. Teachers partnered closely with laboratory technicians to develop hands-on learning experiences aligned with the Hedland Instructional Model, Our Way, ensuring consistency in pedagogy and enhancing student engagement through the practical application of scientific concepts.

The Science team hosted and participated in professional learning through the Einstein First program, which focused on hands-on activities illustrating how Einstein's theories provide a more accurate understanding of the physical world compared to Newtonian physics. The session included practical demonstrations that deepened teachers' understanding of key concepts, such as the gravity simulator, and covered effective lesson sequencing to enhance student learning and engagement.

Two staff members accompanied a group of ATAR students to Perth for a specialist study camp, where students engaged with ATAR teaching experts, collaborated with peers from other schools, and developed effective study habits to support their academic success.

A strong culture of reflection and continuous improvement underpinned our work. Teachers analysed student achievement data to review and refine course outlines, ensuring our programs remained responsive to student needs and aligned with curriculum expectations.

The Science Department remains committed to delivering high-quality, engaging, and future-focused science education for all students.

English

In 2024, the English Department at Hedland Senior High School welcomed four English teachers and one Aboriginal and Islander Education Officer, growing our amazing team to eleven committed staff members. The addition of two new laptop trolleys improved our capacity to deliver targeted interventions using digital platforms like Education Perfect, which was rolled out to all students in Years 7–10 and select groups of Years 11–12. Year 12 students participated in weekly English skills development sessions throughout the year. These sessions were designed to support OLNA goals and were delivered through Education Perfect, allowing for differentiated instruction based on student needs. In addition, the creation of a 0.2 FTE Literacy Coordinator role provided additional capacity for developing and leading literacy strategies across the school, as well as targeted small group literacy instruction.

Staff worked in partnership with Anne-Maree Liddellow from Statewide Services to refine teaching approaches and support curriculum development. In line with a school-wide literacy focus, students in Years 7 to 10 read at least one novel per term, either as a core text or to complement their studies. This approach aimed to build vocabulary, creative writing and language skills, and improve reading fluency and comprehension.

English students used their notebooks throughout the year to reflect on their progress and implement feedback, they were kept in class and assessed as part of a semester-long task. This allowed teachers to monitor student progress more consistently and saw an improvement in English grades for the 7-10 cohorts where our grade distribution is now above expected compared to like schools. All assessment tasks were published on Compass, with rubrics and feedback accessible to students and parents to support greater engagement in learning and reporting.

An extra-curricular Book Club was launched in 2024, running every Friday at lunch time in the English department. Throughout the year, this group has grown from approximately 10 to now over 25 students who regularly attend, plus other students who pop in occasionally. Book Club is a fantastic opportunity for students to come and sit and read with others who also enjoy reading for pleasure, and to share recommendations and reviews on their favourite books.



The English department also received a grant to have the Youth UN come and run a workshop with 30 students. Class 7ENG1 was selected for this opportunity. A group of young people representing the Youth UN organisation came to HSHS and ran a full day workshop for the students. Students got to learn all about what the UN was, how it runs and some of the main issues that are being discussed in the UN currently.

Year 12 ATAR English staff engaged in small group moderation with Sevenoaks Senior College, which improved our WACE moderation data compared with the previous year. Students also had the opportunity to participate in a Scribblers creative writing incursion, which focused on building engagement with narrative writing.

During the 2024 Book Week, the English department ran a creative writing competition with the theme "reading is magic". Students were able to submit a story or poem in the genre of their choice based on the prompt. This competition attracted students from Years 7 to 10, and we had a large amount of high calibre entries across the school.

Overall, 2024 was a year of growth and innovation for the English Department at Hedland Senior High School. We have built a more connected and effective learning environment for our students with positive relationships and staff collaboration.



Health & Physical Education

In 2024, the Health and Physical Education Department underwent significant growth across a number of areas. In addition to retaining all staff from the previous year, the department was further bolstered through welcoming a new Head of Learning Area and three valuable new members from across Australia and New Zealand.

The creation of the new School Houses and Events Coordinator role fulfilled by Eric Dawud saw existing carnivals and events strengthened, as well as successful implementation of new initiatives including the Hedland Hustle Cross Country and House Week. Hosting the Interschool Athletics Carnival saw Karratha Senior High School, St Luke's College and Newman Senior High School come to Hedland, with a well-run event being won by Hedland Senior High School.

Among a busy calendar of incursion and excursions that the Health and Physical Education Department offered, the standout event was the Country Week Carnival in Perth during the final week of term two. The team of almost 50 students travelled to Perth with the opportunity to compete in a variety of sports against other Western Australian regional schools. During the competition and trip more broadly, students represented Hedland Senior High School and the wider community exceptionally well, achieving a high level of results across sports.

The Learning Area concluded the year with a thorough and widespread review process of learning programs, with significant improvements taking place in preparation for implementation of revised curriculum in 2025.



Technologies & Enterprise

Home Economics

Last year, our Home Economics thrived as students learnt multicultural recipes and modern cooking techniques, helping broaden their culinary knowledge. The new sewing machines and projects allowed students to explore their creative potential.

In our Childcare, Family and Community course, the introduction of modern resources and updated programs kept students engaged and well-prepared for careers in childcare and community services.

Design and Technology

Our Building and Construction students made great progress, improving their practical skills through innovative projects. Students also had a strong focus on safety, helping strengthen pathways for students entering the construction industry.

Woodwork students excelled by learning both traditional and modern techniques, producing impressive projects that showcased their skills and understanding. The clear connection between design and hands-on work helped students develop a strong passion for our learning area. The Metalwork program continued to build real-world connections, with students learning a range of shaping and cutting techniques. Students continued this versatile understanding through learning multiple joining methods for different types of metals."
